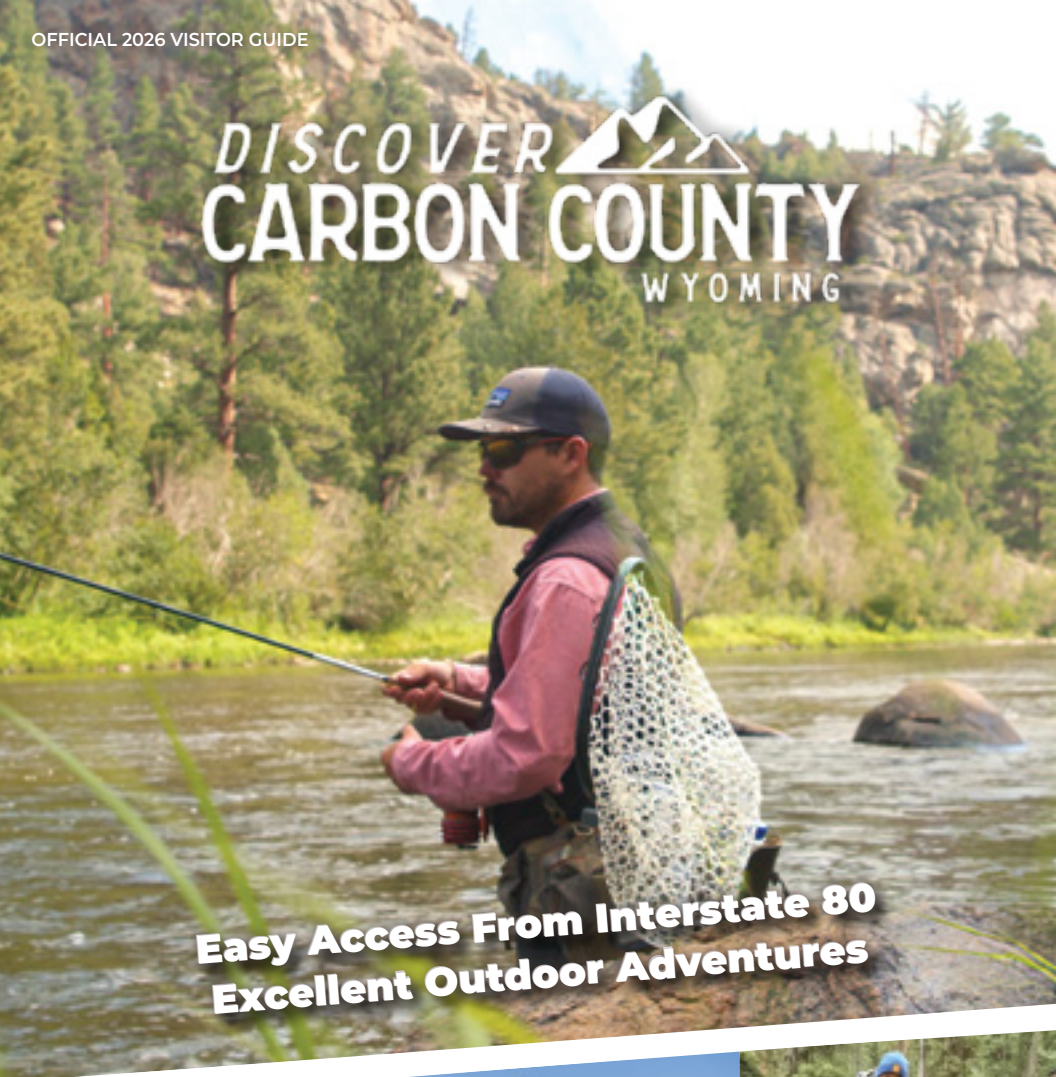
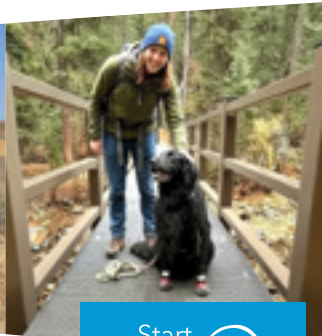

Welcome to Carbon County, Wyoming

Space to roam. Freedom to linger.

There's a place in southern Wyoming where the horizon stretches forever, rivers wind through sagebrush plains, and snow-capped peaks rise like old friends on the skyline. This is Carbon County—nearly 8,000 square miles of wide-open beauty and genuine Western spirit.

Here, adventure moves at your pace. Quiet, uncrowded trails lead into high country. Scenic backroads reward those willing to take the long way. Cast a line in blue-ribbon trout waters, soak in natural mineral hot springs, and follow mountain drives past granite peaks and across the Continental Divide. In winter, deep snow and miles of backcountry let you open it up and ride without limits.

For generations, people have moved west through this county, first along the Emigrant Trails, then by rail and highway. Today, that history lives on in ten museums, a frontier Army post historic site, and historic downtowns.

Come explore, unwind, and find your own sense of freedom in Carbon County.

COME EXPLORE

Beautiful Carbon County

At the heart of southern Wyoming, the landscapes are vast, the roads are scenic, and every turn invites exploration. From open sagebrush basins to forested peaks and winding rivers, Carbon County is made for travelers who love the freedom of the road and the thrill of discovery. Here, you'll find a place both untamed and welcoming — where history, wilderness, and small-town warmth flow together.

Travel the **Snowy Range Scenic Byway** (WY-130) and the **Battle Pass Scenic Byway** (WY-70) for mountain views, changing seasons, and easy access to trails and picnic spots. Follow the **Seminole-Alcova Backcountry Byway** to Seminole Reservoir, Seminole State Park and the famed Miracle Mile, where boating, camping, and fishing unfold in solitude. And along the **Historic Lincoln Highway** (WY-30), connect with the pioneering routes that helped open the American West.

In **Rawlins**, history meets high-plains adventure along the Continental Divide Trail. Visitors tee off beneath endless sky at **Rochelle Ranch Golf Course** and unwind downtown after a day of exploring. Nearby **Sinclair** blends refined architecture with a proud energy legacy, while **Hanna**, **Medicine Bow**, and **Elk Mountain** echo the determination of pioneers, miners, and railroaders who built these communities.

In the valley between the Snowy Range and Sierra Madre Mountain Range, **Saratoga** welcomes travelers to its soothing mineral hot pools and scenic fairways — the perfect reward after a day of fishing, or floating along the Upper North Platte River. Beyond, **Encampment** and **Riverside** rest along the Encampment River, offering quiet trails, friendly faces, and the kind of calm that's hard to find elsewhere.

At the far western edge, the Little Snake River Valley—home to **Baggs**, **Dixon**, and **Savery**—tells stories of outlaws, homesteaders, and wide-open wilderness.

Whether you follow scenic byways, historic trails, or winding rivers, every path leads to an authentic experience that can only be found in Carbon County.





KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

Trip Planning Essentials

Before you chase the next scenic overlook or pull off onto a tempting backroad, take a minute to travel like a local. Carbon County is big, beautiful, and wonderfully uncrowded—but that also means real miles between towns, fast-changing weather, and stretches where cell service disappears. This section covers the basics for navigating Carbon County's wide-open spaces, changing seasons, and off-the-grid adventures.

Getting Here & Getting Around

The open road is part of the Carbon County experience. **Interstate 80** carries travelers east to west across Wyoming, while state highways lead to smaller communities, winding rivers, and wide-open country.

Two of Wyoming's most unforgettable routes—the **Snowy Range Scenic Byway** and the **Battle Pass Scenic Byway**—climb through alpine forests and across sweeping vistas, where every turn reveals a new view. These byways open with the snowmelt, *usually from Memorial Day weekend through October*, and close again when winter takes hold. Even Interstate 80 isn't immune to Wyoming's weather, with occasional closures for snow or high winds. So it pays to check conditions before you go.

Check Roads & Conditions

Scan for real-time closures and webcams via WYDOT.



Seasons & Weather Planning

SUMMER

Warm days, cool nights — perfect for fishing, hiking, and scenic drives.

FALL

Crisp, colorful, and quieter — great for wildlife viewing and leaf peeping.

WINTER

Can bring heavy snow and icy roads — ideal for hot pool soaks, snowmobiling, and cozy lodge stays.

SPRING

Variable weather and muddy backroads — best for birdwatching and spotting early wildflowers.



Miles Worth The Drive

Travel Smart Tips

ALTITUDE AWARENESS

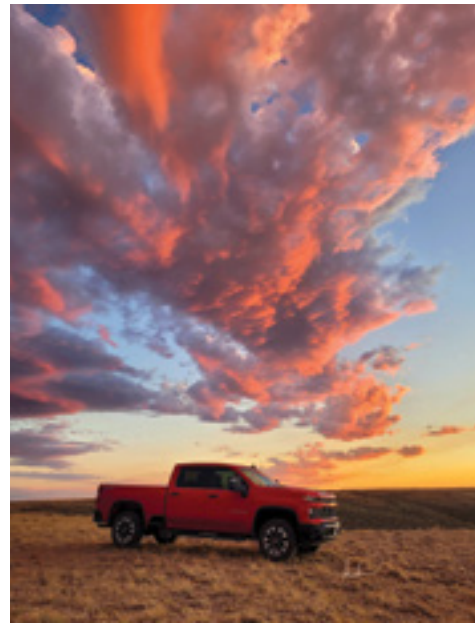
Carbon County elevations range from 6,000–10,000 ft. Give yourself time to adjust — drink water and take it slow on day one.

WINTER DRIVING

A little prep goes a long way — pack blankets, water, and snacks, top off your tank, and check road conditions before heading out.

WILDLIFE ON THE ROAD

Deer, elk, and pronghorn antelope are most active at dawn and dusk. Drive cautiously, especially on rural highways.





HIGH, WIDE, AND UNCROWDED Outdoor Adventures

Carbon County is a tale of two landscapes. To the south, the **Snowy Range** and **Sierra Madre Mountain Range** offer alpine lakes, cool forests, and peaks touching 12,000 feet—perfect for hiking, camping, and snowmobiling. To the north and west, the high desert stretches out. This is the domain of wild horses, pronghorn, and miles of wide-open backroads.

The **Upper North Platte River** runs the length of the county, sliding from mountain headwaters into wide sagebrush valleys—calling anglers, paddlers, and wanderers. Above it, the **Continental Divide Trail** threads across Carbon County, climbing into high country, then dropping into open basins. With each ridge and valley, the land shifts into new scenery and a fresh experience.

Adventure here still feels wild and real. From alpine trails and rushing rivers to open plains and star-filled skies, every turn beckons you to slow down, breathe deeper, and follow your own sense of discovery.

Rivers & Rides

From sunrise casts to whitewater runs, the waters of Carbon County invite every kind of escape—floats, fly rods, and open-water days.

The **Upper North Platte River** is the signature float and fly-fishing experience. Recognized as Blue Ribbon trout water, it runs lively when snowmelt is on, then unwinds into a calmer drift through cottonwoods and open valley.

The **Encampment River** offers a quieter, more intimate float in a tighter canyon-and-cottonwood corridor before joining the Platte. Along both rivers, keep your eyes on the banks for wildlife—and look up for eagles posted in riverside snags and circling overhead.

Farther north, the legendary **Miracle Mile** has a reputation for trophy-sized fish while the vast **Seminole Reservoir** draws boaters, campers, and those chasing walleye, trout, and sunset reflections.



On the Trail

In Carbon County, days on the land start by trading pavement for pine-scented air and a trail network that feels endless. Two mountain ranges anchor the experience in the **Medicine Bow-Routt National Forest**: the **Snowy Range**, where high routes climb toward **Medicine Bow Peak** and bright alpine lakes, and the **Sierra Madre Mountain Range**, quieter and more remote, with deep forests, big views, and a true backcountry feel.

Choose a short ramble or a day hike that slips into wilderness solitude. Take the **Tie Hack Trail** through aspens and old timber country, the **Green Mountain Falls Trail** for a scenic waterfall hike, or follow a segment of the **Continental Divide Trail** for horizon-to-horizon views.

However you like to travel—boots, pedals, or saddle—designated routes and signed ORV trails open the way to overlooks, campgrounds, and wide-open scenery.



Off-Road Frontiers

For those who chase dust and horizon, the backroads of Carbon County are pure freedom. Miles of two-tracks and mountain routes twist through sagebrush valleys and forested ridges, linking ghost towns, lookouts, and lakes. The **Wyoming Backcountry Discovery Route (WYBDR)** carves through this country—a dream for UTV, ATV, and motorcycle riders eager to test their skill on terrain that shifts from high desert to alpine.



Continental Divide Trail (CDT)

The (CDT) crosses the entire length of Carbon County, linking mountains, valleys, and wide-open basin country along the backbone of the continent.

In the **Sierra Madre Mountain Range**, access near **Battle Pass** on WY-70—just west of **Encampment and Riverside** (CDT Gateway communities)—leads into aspen and spruce, then up to panoramic ridges overlooking the Platte Valley.

It's ideal for a day hike, a horseback outing, or a short ride where bikes and ORVs are allowed, without needing weeks on the trail.

Farther north, the CDT reaches **Rawlins** (a Gateway community) and spills into the **Great Divide Basin**—a vast, wind-carved expanse of sage and sky where water flows neither east nor west. Many travelers use Rawlins as a gateway and resupply point before heading into one of the most remote landscapes on the entire 3,000-mile trail.

Trail Tips

- Best windows: late June–Sept. in the mountains; spring/fall for basin travel.
- Always check weather, fire restrictions, road status (WY-70 closes seasonally).
- Carry extra water and layers as conditions shift fast with elevation.



Campfire Nights

Adventure days end best with stars overhead. From forest campgrounds to riverside and reservoir sites, Carbon County gives campers and RV travelers room to spread out. Settle in under a Wyoming sky—just quiet, starlight, and space to breathe.

Wild Country & Hunting

Here, wildlife is part of the view. Travelers may spot **pronghorn antelope** cutting across the sage, **mule deer** in the draws, **elk** in the timber, and raptors riding thermals along rimrock and river corridors. **Bald eagles, hawks,** and **osprey** are common companions along the Upper North Platte, Encampment, and around Seminole Reservoir, giving birders and photographers plenty to watch without needing to leave the main routes.

Hunters know this country for its elk, deer, and pronghorn seasons—public lands, big units, and a long tradition of do-it-right preparation and respect for private property. Here, success is measured in both harvest and how well you care for the ground you walk.



Snowmobiling

Carbon County winter is built for throttle and powder. Riders come for **500+ miles of groomed and ungroomed trails** across the Snowy Range and Sierra Madre Mountain Range, plus the backcountry access that lets you keep exploring beyond the groomed loops. Basecamps at Ryan Park, Encampment and Riverside put you close to trailheads and junctions—warm up, fuel up, and head back out into wide meadows, timbered runs, and big Wyoming scenery.



Cross-Country & Snowshoeing

Enjoy Carbon County's winter scenery through quiet stands of aspen, spruce and fir trees. The **Brush Creek** (Snowy Range) and **Bottle Creek** (Sierra Madre Range) trail systems are maintained for cross-country skiing and snowshoeing—offering loops of varying length. Choose your pace while soaking up deep-forest stillness and snowy meadows.



Ice Fishing & Derby Days

When lakes freeze up, Carbon County becomes a winter angler's paradise—auger humming at first light, a warm drink in hand, and rods set in anticipation of a bite. The **Saratoga Lake Ice Fishing Derby** (the third weekend in January, weather/ice dependent) brings anglers together for friendly competition, prizes, and a weekend on the ice. **Seminole Reservoir** is the big-water play, with strong potential for walleye and trout and wide-open horizons.

Adventure Doesn't Hibernate

Winter in Carbon County brings a quieter kind of magic. Scenic byways trade tires for tracks as snowmobilers glide along groomed routes framed by wide pullouts and mountain views. Summer trails used for hiking and biking turn into peaceful corridors for cross-country skiing, while frozen lakes draw ice-fishing tents and laughter on clear, cold mornings. Along the rivers, open water keeps anglers casting, and it's common to spot eagles soaring overhead or mule deer and pronghorn crossing the snow-covered plains.

After a day of snow and sunshine, there's no better feeling than sinking into the **Saratoga Hot Pools**, where mineral-rich water steams in the winter air. It's a favorite gathering spot for snowmobilers, travelers, and locals alike—some seeking relief, others simply savoring the soothing warmth.

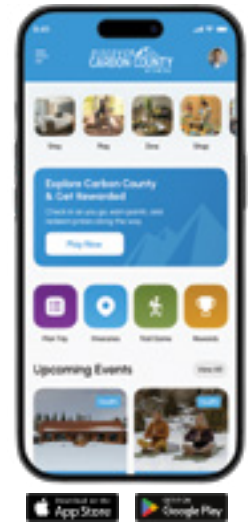
As snow settles on the valley floors, Carbon County's communities come alive with winter traditions and small-town celebrations. The **Saratoga Lake Ice Fishing Derby**, **Sierra Madre Winter Carnival**, and **Saratoga Skijoring Races** bring excitement to January and February. Visitors enjoy cozy restaurants and boutique shops year-round. Local museums—many open by appointment in the off-season—offer another way to experience Carbon County's rich heritage.

Whether you come for the thrill, the stillness, or the camaraderie, winter in Carbon County doesn't slow life down—it simply changes the scenery. Pack for adventure and comfort, so you can enjoy everything from snow-covered trails to a soothing soak in the hot pools.

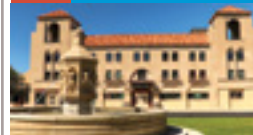

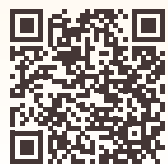

Here, we don't hibernate. We celebrate. From winter carnivals to summer rodeos, there's always a reason to gather in Carbon County.

Carbon County's signature annual events are just the start. Throughout 2026, you'll also find **America 250 celebrations**, special programs, and one-time community gatherings woven into each community's calendar. These are highlighted in the community spotlight sections of this guide.

Winter in Carbon County is filled with warm gathering places, and weekends built around skijoring energy, ice fishing competition, winter carnival celebrations, and community dances that keep the season lively long after dark.

Spring arrives with a quickening pace. Museums start opening their doors again with hands-on history, locals pour into block-party-style gatherings, and the first sunny stretches bring a "get outside" buzz—golf course opening days, family-friendly tournaments, and small-town celebrations.

Summer is the full-throttle season, and 2026 turns it up another notch with parades, live music, rodeo dust, art festivals, and small-town traditions. Across multiple days, the Carbon County Fair & Rodeo becomes the centerpiece—especially in 2026, marking the fair's 100th anniversary—with PRCA rodeo action, concerts, livestock shows and sales, a demolition derby, and horse events that keep the fairgrounds busy from morning through late night.

Fall brings harvest vibes and hometown flavor, with food- and-whiskey style festivals, local tastings, crisp-air fun runs, museum celebrations, and prison night tours that lean into the season's eerie side.

Plan to come for a weekend—and you may find yourself staying for the week. Because in Carbon County, there's always another celebration just down the road.

BEAUTIFUL SCENIC DRIVES

Take the Long Way



In Carbon County, the “scenic route” isn’t a detour—it’s the main event. One drive skims high granite and alpine lakes, another slips over the Continental Divide through the quiet Sierra Madre Mountain Range, and a third rolls into reservoir country where the land opens wide and the road feels wonderfully far from everything. Pick a byway, bring snacks, and plan to stop often—these miles are meant to be savored.

Snowy Range Scenic Byway

In just **29 miles**, the **Snowy Range Scenic Byway (WY-130)** carries you from Centennial into crisp, high alpine country. **Medicine Bow Peak** commands the skyline and reappears bend after bend. The paved drive is short on mileage but huge on payoff. **Roadside alpine lakes** invite a few casts, **picnic pullouts** turn into long lunches, and **trailheads** offer everything from easy strolls to the classic climb toward the Peak.

You can drive it in **about an hour**, but most people make it a half day. Watch for moose and other wildlife, pause at **Lake Marie**, and linger at **Libby Flats** (the route’s highest point at 10,847 feet) for wide-open views by day—and **stargazing and Milky Way watching** after dark.

Scenic byways are open seasonally from Memorial Day through late October, weather permitting.

Seminole-Alcova Backcountry Byway

The **Seminole-Alcova Backcountry Byway** runs about **64 miles** between Sinclair and Alcova, carrying you into a palette of Wyoming color—rust-red rock, pale sand, sage-green flats, and deep blue water set against open sky. Plan on **about 2 hours** of drive time, because the scenery is made for pullouts: high ridgelines, reservoir overlooks, and big, clear views. Watch hillsides and breaks for **pronghorn antelope, mule deer, and bighorn sheep**.

For anglers, the byway is a gateway to **Seminole Reservoir**—a standout for **walleye and trout**, with boating access inside **Seminole State Park**.

Battle Pass Scenic Byway

Between Encampment and Baggs, the **Battle Pass Scenic Byway (WY-70)** winds through the Sierra Madre Mountain Range with **one scenic overlook after another**. The paved route is about **57 miles** and typically **1.5–2 hours**. It’s the kind of drive that naturally turns into a string of pullouts and short side stops, with sweeping panoramic views. Near the **Battle Pass Summit** (9,955 feet), you cross the **Continental Divide** and can access the **Continental Divide Trail**.

At each end of the drive, the story deepens. The **Grand Encampment Museum** and the **Little Snake River Valley Museum** anchor the route with historic buildings and mining and homestead era artifacts. In select years, the **Colorado Grand** vintage car rally has included a stop at the Grand Encampment Museum, with the cars displayed on the grounds.



Following the North Platte River’s chain of reservoirs, the route reveals one of its most dramatic sights—**Kortes Dam** tucked into the steep walls of **Black Canyon**. From here, you’re also within easy reach of the famed **Miracle Mile**.

Despite the “backcountry” name, this route is straightforward to navigate—but it **isn’t paved all the way**. Expect a mix of paved and gravel roads, with a steep gravel stretch north of Seminole State Park **through the Seminole Mountains**. *Large A-class motorhomes will not make it down or up the switchbacks between Seminole & Kortes dams, so please plan ahead.*

History & Heritage

Carbon County's story is really a story of movement—of people, animals, and ideas traveling the same wide valleys in different eras. Indigenous peoples followed rivers and hot springs long before wagon trains, stage routes, steel tracks, and paved highways stitched this corridor into the story of the American West.

As you follow this timeline, you'll venture from Overland Trail stages and Union Pacific steam engines to the Lincoln Highway's early coast-to-coast motorists, copper tramways, coal camps, hot-springs resorts, airmail fields, and the infamous "Snow Chi Minh Trail" stretch of I-80. It all leads to today, as Carbon County joins communities across the nation in marking 250 years of the United States—using its own forts, depots, museums, and main streets as front-row seats to the **America 250 celebrations** happening here this summer.

PRE-1800s

Indigenous Homelands
Indigenous peoples lived, traveled, and gathered along the North Platte, hot springs, and surrounding mountains long before settlers.

1868-1889

Railroad, Rawlins, & Fort Fred Steele
The Union Pacific pushed across southern Wyoming, made Rawlins a division point, built Fort Fred Steele to guard the Platte River crossing, and founded the coal towns of Carbon and later Hanna to fuel its steam engines.

LATE 1800s

Baggs & The Outlaw Trail
Baggs grew as a freight and ranching hub on the Rawlins-Baggs Road and gained a reputation as an outlaw hangout.



1901

Wyoming State Penitentiary
The sandstone Wyoming State Penitentiary opened in Rawlins and housed inmates for about 80 years.

1920s

Parco Becomes Sinclair
An oil refinery rose east of Rawlins in 1922-1923, and a Spanish-style planned town called Parco grew up around it before being renamed Sinclair in the early 1940s.

1930s

Saratoga's Hobo Hot Springs
Civilian Conservation Corps crews added stonework and railings to formalize the soaking area at the Hobo Pools hot springs. In 1984, the Town of Saratoga acquired the Hobo Hot Pool property with the condition that it remain free and open to the public, ensuring 24-hour, year-round access.



1862

Overland Trail & Fort Halleck
The U.S. Army built Fort Halleck near Elk Mountain to guard stage and freight traffic on the Overland Trail.

1878-1881

Outlaws & Frontier Justice
After a failed train robbery, "Big Nose" George Parrott was lynched in Rawlins in 1881, cementing the town's rough justice reputation.

1897-1908

Encampment Copper Boom
Copper strikes in the Sierra Madre Mountain Range briefly turned Encampment into a major copper and timber center.

1910

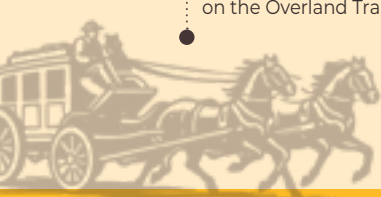
Lincoln Highway
The Lincoln Highway carried some of America's first motorists along what is now US-30 past Medicine Bow, Hanna, and Rawlins.

1929-1931

Airmail & Medicine Bow Airport
Medicine Bow Airport was built in 1929 as a transcontinental airmail field and in 1931 gained radio beacons that helped complete coast-to-coast radio navigation.

1938

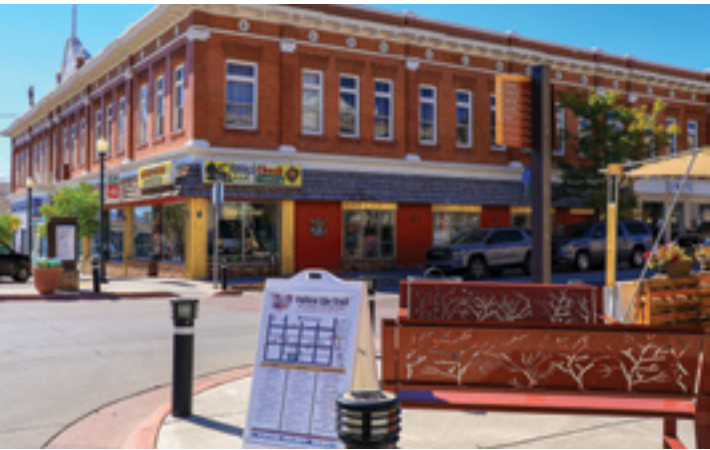
Seminole Dam & State Park
Seminole Dam was completed in 1938, storing water and generating power by 1939. Seminoe State Park was established around the reservoir in 1965.



CROSSROADS COUNTRY

Rawlins & Sinclair

Rawlins and neighboring Sinclair sit along I-80, where the high desert opens wide and Carbon County's travel corridors converge. Rawlins is the **crossroads city**—a meeting point for rail lines, historic routes, modern road-trippers, and CDT hikers moving through Wyoming's big, open country. It pairs frontier justice and rail-era, mural-lined downtown streets with big-sky golf, high-desert hiking, and quick day trips to Seminoe country. Just east, Sinclair showcases classic oil-boom architecture and serves as an easy jumping-off point for Seminoe Reservoir and Seminoe State Park.



History

Rawlins grew up around Rawlins Springs in the 1860s and quickly became a Union Pacific Railroad division point and service center for the industries that shaped the region—railroad work, ranching, lumber, and coal. Its imposing sandstone penitentiary (now the **Wyoming Frontier Prison**), the **Carbon County Museum**, and the **historic downtown** together capture the rough-edged frontier era that followed.

Sinclair was built in the 1920s as Parco, a planned refinery town. The Spanish Colonial Revival

architecture and plaza-centered layout helped the **Sinclair/Parco Historic District** earn its listing on the National Register of Historic Places. The **Parco/Sinclair Museum** adds hands-on context to the town's refinery-era roots.

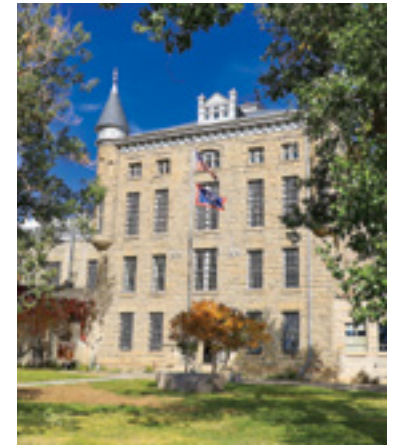

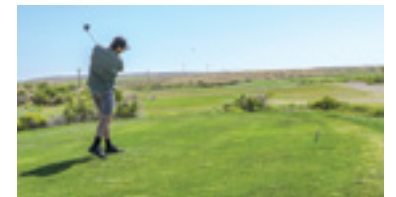

HOT SPRINGS ON THE NORTH PLATTE

Saratoga

Saratoga is a **river-and-hot-springs town** in south-central Carbon County, set on the Upper North Platte River about 20 miles south of I-80 via WY-130/230. It's the Platte Valley basecamp—where travelers trade highway miles for a free soak at the 24-hour Hobo Hot Pool, a strollable downtown anchored by the Historic Hotel Wolf, and long days fishing or floating blue-ribbon trout water. Quick access to Saratoga Lake, the Snowy Range to the east, and the Sierra Madre Mountain Range to the south and west make this a natural 1-3 night base for relaxing and exploring the Platte Valley.



History

For generations, Native peoples used the hot springs along the **Upper North Platte River** as a neutral gathering and healing place, drawn by a steady flow of mineral-rich, naturally heated water. Euro-American settlement followed in the late 1800s, and by the early 1880s Saratoga was already welcoming guests from across the region. The **Hotel Wolf** opened in 1893, signaling Saratoga's role as a true destination.

Rail service in the late 19th and early 20th centuries helped the town

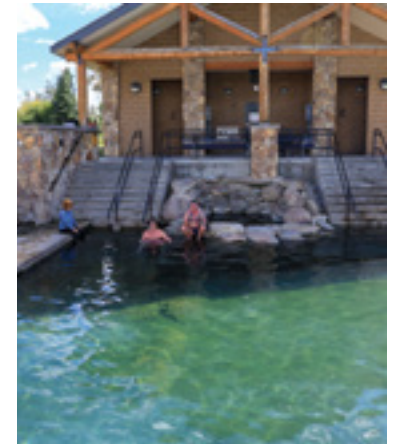
stabilize and grow. The hot pool later came under town ownership with a requirement that it **stay free and open to the public**, cementing Saratoga's identity.

Today, the former depot serves as the **Saratoga Museum**, the **Hobo Hot Pool** still steams beside the river, and the town's mix of historic buildings, fishing culture, golf, and quick access to the **Snowy Range** and **Sierra Madre Mountain Range** reflects more than a century of evolution from frontier health stop to laid-back Platte Valley basecamp.

WHERE HISTORY MEETS HIGH COUNTRY

Encampment & Riverside

Encampment and Riverside are quiet mountain towns located in the southern end of Carbon County along WY-230/70, where museum history, short hikes, and scenic drives all fit into one easy getaway.

Spend half a day at the **Grand Encampment Museum (GEM)**, exploring its historic buildings and tramway segment, then head out on the **Encampment River Trail** for canyon views and riverside fishing. With an extra day or two, take a scenic drive over the **Continental Divide** via the **Battle Pass Scenic Byway (WY-70)**. Add a short hike in the **Medicine Bow National Forest** or to the **Indian Bathtubs**. Round out your days with peaceful evenings in these CDT Gateway communities.



History

Encampment started as a fur-trade rendezvous site in the 1800s and later boomed as “Grand Encampment,” a copper-mining center served by a spectacular aerial tramway that carried ore down from the **Sierra Madre Mountain Range**. When copper prices collapsed and smelter operations failed, mining faded and the town shifted back to ranching, timber, and a quieter river-valley life shared with nearby Riverside.

COWBOYS, COAL TOWNS & BIG BAND CROWDS

Medicine Bow, Hanna & Elk Mountain

If you like your road trips with a side of legend, the stretches through Medicine Bow, Hanna, and Elk Mountain feel like flipping through an old Western photo album. Follow the **Historic Lincoln Highway (WY-30/287)** to Medicine Bow for a landmark stop at the three-story **Historic Virginian Hotel** and the **Medicine Bow Museum**—railroad tales, cowboy-literary lore, and a hint of fossil country in one place. About 20 miles west, Hanna shifts the tone from romance to grit, where the **Hanna Basin Museum** and miners’ memorials put a Union Pacific coal town—and its disasters—front and center. Then slide down to I-80 for Elk Mountain, a river-shaded pause where the **Elk Mountain Hotel** and the **Elk Mountain Museum** echo stage-route days and **Garden Spot Pavilion** big-band crowds that once packed this quiet bend in the river.



History

Medicine Bow rose as a railroad and **Lincoln Highway** town—an era still reflected in the Virginian Hotel and the depot. Named for Owen Wister’s novel *The Virginian*, the hotel became one of the grandest stays between Denver and Salt Lake City. Hanna, founded by the **Union Pacific Coal Company** in the late 1800s, became a major coal-camp hub marked by both prosperity and tragic mine explosions in 1903 and 1908. Elk Mountain grew around a strategic **Medicine Bow River** crossing used by emigrants, stage lines, and Fort Halleck, later gaining a 1905 hotel and dance pavilion that drew big-name bands and hundreds of dancers from across the region.

LITTLE SNAKE LORE & RED DESERT DETOURS

Baggs, Dixon & Savery

When you're ready to leave the crowds behind, southwest Carbon County's Little Snake River Valley is your kind of detour—remote, scenic, and story-rich. Baggs, Dixon, and Savery sit along ranchlands and a winding river on a key stretch of the [Wyoming Backcountry Discovery Route \(WYBDR\)](#).

Spend a few hours at the [Little Snake River Museum](#) in Savery, where historic buildings pull you into trapper, homesteader, and ranching history. Then roll into Dixon, a tiny junction where riders and road-trippers trade stories at the [Dixon Club](#). In Baggs, lean into the outlaw-tinged past at the [Outlaw Stop's Mathews/Gaddis House](#) and the old town hall/jail—both tied to Butch Cassidy lore. If you have an extra day, wander into the [Red Desert](#) to spot wild horses or take the [Battle Pass Scenic Byway \(WY-70\)](#) for big views, easy pullouts and short hikes.



History

The Little Snake River Valley's small towns began as scattered ranches, irrigation projects, and trading posts. Over time, those roots grew into the linked communities of Savery, Dixon, and Baggs. The valley earned a reputation for colorful outlaws moving through its remote country, but the real story is everyday life—ranchers, homesteaders, and people like mountain man [Jim Baker](#), whose cabin still anchors local lore.
